Who is this course for?

The course is for 19+ adult learners who have an interest in criminology, crime scene investigation and forensics. This is ideal for those either wanting to pursue a career in criminology or who may be advancing onto university to study a similar field. However, this course is also perfectly suitable for those who have a keen interest in criminology, via the media and television series/documentaries.

What do you need to apply for the course?

No previous qualifications are essential, although a Level 1/2 qualification in English would be recognised as being advantageous.

You must have previously completed the 'Introduction to Criminal Investigation – Part 1' and 'Crime Scene Investigation – Part 2' 10 week courses. Alternatively, you could complete an intense programme consisting of Part 1, 2 and 3 alongside each other.

What are the key things you'll learn?

Learners will examine how to produce a criminal profile based upon the contrasting British and American methods. You will study key techniques associated with geographical profiling, including specific forensic procedures from real crime scenes. You will compile these techniques to create your own criminal profile from a staged crime scene.

How will you learn?

Learners will have a blend of theoretical learning that is endorsed by practical

application over a 10 week period. You will be asked to complete three written assessments and one practical assessment.

Where could this course take you?

These three Criminology short-courses could be of real benefit to your CV if you wish to pursue a career in criminology or who may be advancing onto university to study a similar field. It may even be a method of completing required Continuing Professional Development (CPD), if you are already practising as a criminology professional and/or student.

Alternatively, it may simply satisfy your intrigue and fascination, after all the concept of criminology is revealed to us all on a daily basis via the media.
